Are you Wheat or a Weed?

MT 13:24 Jesus told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field. But while everyone was sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went away. When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared."



"The owner's servants came to him and said, 'Sir, didn't you sow good seed in your field? Where then did the weeds come from?'"

"As the weeds are pulled up and burned in the fire, so it will be at the end of the age. Your entire throat is inflamed and covered in white spots. It looks like tonsillitis and it couldn't have come at a worse time. In just six hours you would be on a plane from Houston with your husband to attend a wedding of a friend in Los Angeles. Obviously you must get to a doctor quickly for antibiotics.

What's a Mother to Do?

Here was this young ladies dilemma and not an uncommon one in this day and time. She and her husband had recently moved to Beaumont where they had their first baby, my beautiful granddaughter, Olivia. They had a great baby doctor but had never had to see a general practitioner. Well guess what? When she called to see the doctor who was on her approved list, his office insisted that she had to come in for a physical and the earliest they could get to her was two months! Finally, after pleading with the nurse, she said the following: "We'll see you in a week, only if you are feeling bad for this particular ailment and during the examination you promise not to bring up any other malady." If we signed for it, we would get a bill at the end of the month just like we did for the groceries we signed for each month at O'Rear's Grocery just around the corner. (Here is the point in the story where anyone under the age of 35 eyes begins to glaze over.) No, I didn't

have to walk the three miles from our farmhouse to the school in town. I either rode the school bus or took my Sears, Allstate, red scooter; no gears, I had to push it to get it going. (But I digress.)

Our medical system truly was much simpler then. There were no stacks of papers to fill out, no co-payments and you saw the same doctor all the way through college and he did everything from delivering a baby to setting an arm broken from playing football. (My arm, someone else's baby.)

And oh yes, the doctor always decided what treatment you needed. If anyone back then, let alone an insurance company person, dared make the treatment decisions for the doctor, someone, at the very least, would have been 'whupped.' (Not sued.)

Some things were simpler back in the 'old' days.

I liked Jesus' style. He didn't ask the disciples if the people had a PPO or an HMO before he healed them. In Matthew he only asked the two blind men; "Do you believe that I am able to do this?"

The Call of the Natural Life

(Galatians 1:15-16).

Service to God is the deliberate love-gift of a nature that has heard the call of God. Service is an expression of my nature, and God's call is an expression of His nature. Therefore, when I receive His nature and hear His call, His divine voice resounds throughout His nature and mine and the two become one in service. **The Son of God reveals Himself in me, and out of devotion to Him service becomes my everyday way of life.**

Maybe, it's the time of day, the weather or the season.

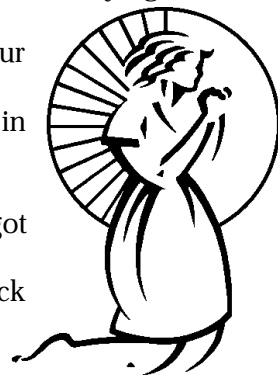
Now I ain't trying to act smart, it's just the way I feel,

I John 3:16-18 "This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers. If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him? **Dear Children let us not love with words of tongue but with actions and truth.**"

How to Become a Christian?

Have you ever wondered what you must do to become a Christian or what you must do to be saved? the Bible has an answer that is easy to understand.

First, You must understand you need to be saved. The bible says you need to be saved because you are a sinner. Your sin has a penalty. You cannot save yourself. The Bible says, "*all have sinned,*" and "*the wages of sin is death*" (Rom. 3:23; 6:23).

Second, You must understand you can be saved. You can be saved because Christ died on the cross for your sins. The Bible says, "*God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us*" (Rom. 5:8).

Third, You must understand what you need to do to be saved. The Bible says how you can be saved. Acts 3:19 says we must repent and turn away from our sins. But repentance alone is not enough. Ephesians 2:8 says that we must place our faith in Jesus Christ to be saved.

Now, you must act if you want to be saved. God is waiting for you to "want to" and to ask Him to save you. The Bible says, "*Whoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved*" (Rom. 10:13). If you are ready to trust Christ as your Savior and Lord, invite Christ into your heart right now by praying to Him. You may word your own prayer or use the prayer printed here. The important thing is that the prayer is sincere and personal.

"Dear Lord Jesus, I know that I am a sinner. I know you died for my sins. Right now I invite you into my heart to be my Savior and Lord. I willingly turn from my sin and give my life to you. thank you for saving me. Amen." Welcome to God's family. You have just made the greatest decision of your life. Tell a pastor or another Christian friend about your decision as soon as possible.

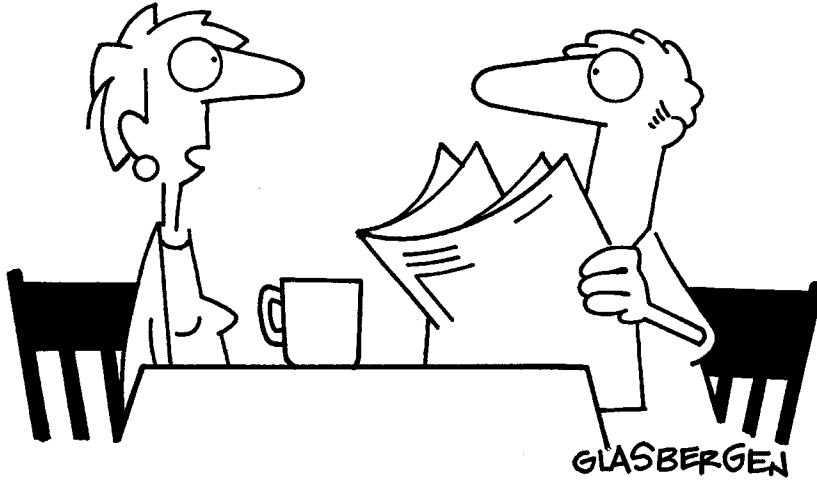

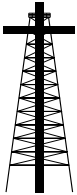
