Oilfield Ministry Sets Pattern for Sharing Gospel

— "just you being here"

*Editor -This is the story about Pam and Drew Crabtree who just days after they retired from Kraft Foods and sold their home in Springfield, Missouri, moved to Big Piney, Wyoming to help minister to the large groups of oilfield workers in Sublette County. Their decision to commit for two years and largely at their expense as **Mission Service Corps volunteers was only after much prayer and God calling them to do so. They had no idea where God was sending them but only that He was.*

They were willing to serve in every state west of the Mississippi and were contacted by every state they sent their resumes to. "How did you choose the remote oil and gas town of Big Piney when you knew nothing about the oil and gas business, I asked?"

It seems the three churches they spoke with shared that they desperately wanted to reach the oil workers but needed help. For some reason the workers did not attend their churches and there were literally hundreds working

on the fifty plus rigs in the county. "From this fact we made our decision to move there," says Drew.

Little did they know what they would encounter as they traveled half way across the country to a small working man's town with not one red light and not one in the entire county; a town proudly proclaiming with a large sign at the city limits, "Icebox of the Nation". You see the temperature during the winter often stays below zero for days. The record recorded low is 63 degrees.

In their words: "We were called by GOD, commissioned by our home church and the North American Mission Board (NAMB), accountable to the local church as "church strengtheners", and partnering with the Oilfield Christian Fellowship of Houston. We arrived on June 8, 2007 to begin the Jonah Field Ministry to the Wyoming oil patch. We were told that the OCF was facilitating a Chapel to be placed in the Big Piney Man Camp but when would it arrive and what do we do in the mean time?"

We began by prayer walking around the community and in the oil patch almost daily. God showed us that much of the oil patch was like us, new to this small community, not really welcome, and were trying to figure out how to live with only a small over-priced grocery store and a second-hand store with the nearest Wal-Mart 120 miles away.

The library proved to be a viable meeting place for ladies and our home for men as we started meetings to net work and meet the community and oil patch. It very soon became evident that the whole community was our mission field as everyone and everything was tied to the oil patch. We began biweekly meetings and advertized by hanging flyers in the grocery store, laundry mat, library, and gas station and handed out

flyers one on one and door to door in the RV Parks, Man Camp and other oil industry housing areas.

The ladies had guest speakers from the local people like doctors, veterans, and the local food pantry plus a devotion and prayer time. The men showed Bible based movies and had prayer time.

Both meetings welcomed anyone who would come. This continued until January 2008. Both groups were handing out the "God's word for the Oil Patch, Fuel for the Soul" Bibles.

On October 20, 2007 the Big Piney Fellowship Chapel, provided by H & B Rentals, arrived at the Big Piney man camp and after handicap ramps were built and a storage building constructed, the Chapel was dedicated on Jan. 12, 2008. It was fully furnished with computers, telephones for long distance, big screen TV, and comfortable seating. The emphasis then moved from the Library and homes to the Big Piney Chapel.



In addition to the big Piney Chapel it became abundantly clear there was also a need for a mobile ministry to the oil fields. The North American Mission Board (NAMB) contacted the Wyoming Southern Baptist Convention about partnering with us on a mobile ministry unit to reach the service and support workers in the oil field. With another MSC couple recruited for the Big Piney Chapel we turned our attention to starting a mobile ministry. In March 2008 the unit was on the field traveling each day to the staging areas, or chain up areas with such things as coffee, biscuits and gravy, "God's word for the Oil Patch, Fuel for the Soul Bibles", tracts, and books like "Every Man's Battle." God opened doors for us to start networks of support groups through the Christians we found in the oil patch. Through these networks we were able to invite pre-Christian or new Christians to churches in the areas in which they currently lived or to one of our Bible Study groups. Friendships developed and a hunger to reach the pre-Christians in the oil patch for the Lord grew.

The Oilfield Christian Fellowship of Wyoming chapter began in October of 2008 in the south west part of the state. Made up of mainly blue collar workers that work long hours and travel long distances to attend, it continues to grow. The need to sub-divide to more local groups under the bigger umbrella of OCF of Wyoming is evident now.

The need for more one on one Bible Studies, small home group Bible Studies and Christian book studies was very evident and the two of us started focusing on teaching folks how to handle God's Word through these various studies. Four times a week I meet with a lady or ladies and Drew does the same every time doors opened with the oil patch workers and church members as we are "church strengtheners".

One young ladies group has shown itself to be especially needy so we keep the Mobile Unit in town one day per week to host a study in our rented home. Made up of oil patch wives, the fish and game officer's wife, deputies wives and teachers wives all with toddlers, God has allowed a network to form that is a life saver to these young mothers in the long winters with such isolation. Drew watches toddlers while we ladies meet. The OCF of Houston faithfully furnishes books and Bibles for these-



Another such meeting continues at the library where, through the original networking we started in 2007, I connected with a group of "rancher ladies" doing a book club. The rancher ladies book club is now a Bible Study as God has opened the door for me to teach them. They had never had anyone willing to teach them the Bible and were particularly interested in the Old Testament which is never spoken of in their churches. These "rancher" ladies are pre-Christian for the most part but many in the young ladies group have come to salvation.

In 2008, the OCF of Houston members again brought God's light to the oil patch with the donation of a second brand new winterized trailer and diesel truck, the donations exceeding eighty thousand dollars. This Mobile Unit manned by retired grocery store owners from North Carolina, Barbara and Harold Lundsford, MSC volunteers like us began ministering to the oil patch workers in January of 2009.

Barbara and Harold did the same thing that we did and were an immediate hit with the workers, many of them accustomed already to dropping by for the free breakfast, coffee, and encouragement, free Bibles and tracts as they did when working in the Big Piney area. Both of these mobile units continue to be a great beacon for Christ and a brief safe harbor for workers who are lonely, weary and far from home.

Where we are today and our vision for the future in the oil patch

The first salvation came through the Big Piney Fellowship Chapel and it was a lady but many more have come to know Christ as their Savior throughout the state. As

"Mr. Crabtree you don't know how many people you influence each day just by coming out here to the oil patch. I've seen you out here many days since the first time I stopped and have went on by, but just seeing the Mobile Chapel here reminds me to pray and I just start praying after I drive by.

You see, sometimes I fall off the wagon, I don't always do things as I should, but when I see this Chapel sitting out here it is a reminder to me and I climb back on the wagon. I know there are other people like me, so you need to know that **just you being here** in the Oilfield help a lot of us, even if we don't stop".

God has also shown the need for Drew to be ordained to do weddings & funerals which again open doors of opportunity to share the love of Christ. Drew's first wedding was this month. God has also opened doors for us to be trained not only as Community (Corporate) Chaplains but Oil Patch Chaplains as well. We are now both commissioned Chaplains certified in Crisis Intervention Stress Management (Group & One on One) as well as Disaster Relief. We continually encourage the stronger oil patch Christians here to follow suit and train as Oil patch Chaplains, a critical need well over due in the oil fields.

What We've Learned

Now that Drew and I have served, see the needs of the people in the oil fields and also in the local towns that depend on the oil and gas business, we can see the potential to duplicate what we've done here for the oil and gas plays in North Dakota, Pennsylvania and the large man camps in Canada.

But this is what is desperately needed first; people to serve!

Pray that God will supply the needs both materially and spiritually through His people to start new ministries, and continue these mentioned, here in Wyoming to reach the oil patch for the Lord. We give thanks for your prayers and support."

Editor – Why is important to share the Gospel to people in the oil patch? Simply put, men and women who work in the oil industry that surrender to Christ can take the Gospel around the world, even to places where missionaries are not allowed.

Action Points:

- We need sponsors to finance a mobile unit in North Dakota where Pam and Drew can man it after July of next year. (A winterized trailer cost about \$35,000 and a Diesel Truck about \$38,000 or a used one would be nice.)
- Pam and Drew have great medical but no dental. She needs to replace her 25 year old bridge works and it is going to cost \$8000. Someone can simply donate the money to the OCF and in turn we will pay the bill, or if anyone has a dentist who would do it for free or cost, they can go wherever to get it done. This needs to be done soon!
- ** When a couple volunteers as mission service corps volunteers they understand that they pay the bulk of their expenses but here are the facts. Their rent, utilities, diesel for the truck and the food they prepare for the people who come to the Chapel and mobile trailer are paid for and their monthly salary for the two of them is \$150! (And I might add, they have never complained about it, rather, "God has always provided.")
- Other retiree volunteers are needed for two year commitments not only to continue the work that Pam and Drew began but for other places as well. For example; Barbara and Harold Lundsford will be fulfilling their two year commitment in December and they need to be replaced.

OCF-OKC Hosts Second Annual Tail Gate Feed at City Rescue Mission of OKC

- 'Turkeys' again to the rescue!

Anyone driving the I-40 "cross-town" elevated highway in OKC on Friday afternoon, August 27th, could probably see or smell the smoke from three large trailer mounted cookers supplied by Anchor Drilling Fluids, Halliburton Services and Smith Services (now part of Schlumberger). The cookers, along with the cooks and many other volunteers were all a part of the second annual tail gate feed at the City Rescue Mission (CRM). The feed was organized and put on by OCF-OKC to help the community by feeding the hungry and giving the staff at CRM a much needed break, as they are accustomed to providing three meals a day, 365 days a year.

Besides food and beverage, there was sharing and caring, plus lawn activities and lots of smiles, thanks and praise of the Lord. It was a blessing to be a part of this event which fed approximately 750 people in two hours. The grills were fired up around 1 PM and serving began at 4 PM as a long line had formed in the heat of the mid-afternoon. But no one was going to let some heat get in the way of what is now an annual event between OCF and CRM.

And this is just the latest partnership between the two groups. OCF-OKC was started in September of 2004 following three organizational meetings during the summer of 2004, all on the first Thursday of each month. At the second meeting in October 2004 it was suggested that we might all bring a frozen turkey to the November meeting (always held on the first Thursday of each month in OKC), to be donated to the CRM for the holidays. On November 4th 2004, we had 22 "turkeys" show up, and each of us had a frozen bird under our arm. And after lunch that day, the 22 frozen turkeys and a couple of hundred dollars (donated by those who didn't have a frozen bird handy) were hand delivered to the CRM by OCF-OKC leader Rick Johnson and a couple of helpers.

Little did we know that the November 2004 effort would begin an annual event that we later dubbed Turkeys to the Rescue (TtR). And starting with 2005, OCF-OKC began an earnest effort to raise funds and awareness of the hunger problem in OKC. And at the same time, awareness of OCF and awareness of Christians in the work place also took on new life and energy. And each year the TtR effort grew and gained more support from other industry events, including those put on by API, AADE, SPE and other similar groups in OKC. By 2008 the growth led to a donation exceeding \$115,000, along with the annual delivery in mid-November of 100 frozen turkeys (an annual tradition of a caravan of oilfield vehicles from the meat market in SE OKC to the CRM in downtown OKC).

Another offshoot of the OCF-OKC/CRM partnership was "I'll buy lunch", where donations were collected at OCF and other industry lunches to help provide funding for meals at the CRM, where the hungry can be fed a delicious warm meal for well less than \$2 per person. The goal of OCF-OKC and TtR each year is to help the CRM with as much of the food budget as possible. And as Rick Johnson often tells the group, "We need to get busy", as we have a lot to do if we are going to do as God requests of us.

"Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was

thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in". Matthew 25:34-35

And busy we shall be, as we plan to make another November turkey and cash delivery, via motorcade and police procession. So join us if you can, whether physically or by spirit and in prayer. As we plan to get real busy and we carry out our annual mission.

We are so glad we could hang out at the City Rescue Mission with Reverend Tom Jones and the rest of the staff on the warm Friday afternoon in late August. What a blessing!

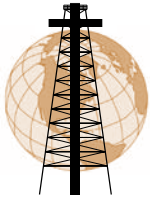
