What Happened on Christmas and Why it Matters

Matthew 1:18-25: 18 This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, “Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.” All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: “The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel” (which means “God with us”). When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded

him and took Mary home as his wife. But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

I want my grandson to know why we celebrate Christmas so today I asked him if he knew what Christmas was all about. He’s five and I hoped for better, but half expected the answer I got. He gave me the American Express edition. “Christmas”, he said, “is about getting presents, putting up a Christmas tree and decorating it and going to the mall and seeing Santa Claus.” “Yes, and no,” I told him. “The real meaning of Christmas is to celebrate the birth of Jesus. It’s His birthday! Those things we do are part of the how we celebrate, but they aren’t the reason for Christmas.”

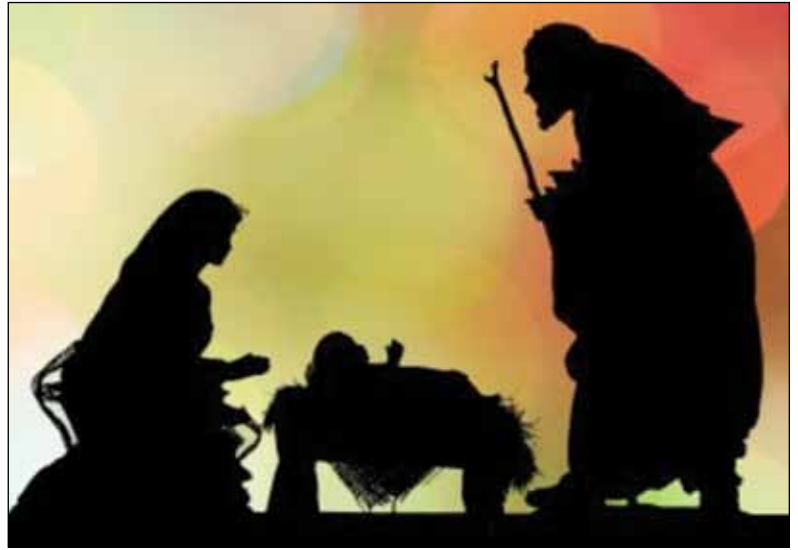

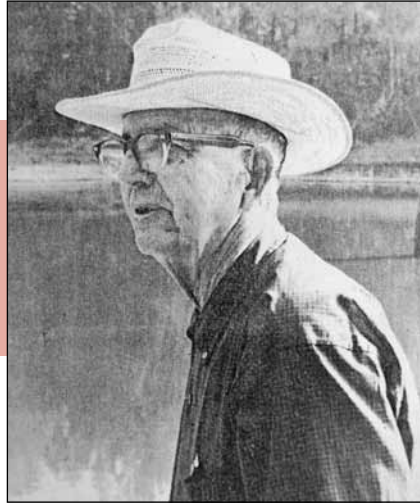

Religious Illiteracy

Atheists know the most about religion, says a recent survey, followed by Jews, Mormons and then evangelical Protestants. The Pew Research Center "U.S. Religious Knowledge Survey" shows that in some areas, Americans are startlingly ignorant about their own religions.

Fewer than half of Catholics are able to name Genesis as the first book of the Bible. Only 28 percent of white evangelicals Protestants know that Protestantism teaches salvation through faith alone, and only a slim majority of Catholics can identify their church's doctrine on communion.

Seventy percent of Jews know that Martin Luther inspired the Reformation, but less than half of Protestants do. The survey also reveals misunderstanding about the constitutional restrictions on religion.

Only 36 percent of the respondents knew a public school teacher may teach a comparative religion class, and only 23 percent knew a teacher may teach the Bible as literature, although the Supreme Court permits both.

Turkeys to the Rescue 2010!

Another year, another delivery; but that really doesn't tell the story.

Each November we total up how much we have collected since the previous November delivery, but just like the City Rescue Mission (CRM) itself, Turkeys to the Rescue (TttR) never really stops or starts, it just keeps going and going and going. As that is what is required to help the CRM keep up with the demand to feed and house those folks (men, women and children) whose lives have taken a turn requiring them to reach out for help. And the CRM is a ministry that is there with the Love of Jesus, ready to minister to so many of their needs. And the OCF-OKC, via TttR, does our small part by supplying turkeys and cash throughout the year. So while we have fun tracking how much we have raised throughout the annual campaign, the real fact is that we are making sure that the CRM receives the funds that are collected. Some of God's children are in need, and the TttR cash helps the CRM to meet some of those needs.

As with recent turkey deliveries, TttR volunteers showed up at the meat market in SE OKC, loaded up 100 frozen turkeys and then caravanned via police motorcycle escort to the CRM in downtown OKC. Upon arrival, volunteers and CRM staff quickly unloaded the frozen birds and then spent a few moments sharing fellowship during the check presentation, which recognized the \$82,500 that was given in addition to the turkeys. Many of the volunteers then stayed at the CRM to take a quick tour and eat lunch before returning to work or home in the afternoon.

OCF-OKC director Rick Johnson and "top turkey" Jeff Hubbard assured me that we have received several checks in the past couple of days, and these funds are being turned over to the CRM. And the generous donors not only receive a nice thank you note and tax receipt from the CRM, but they also receive the wonderful feeling and blessing that comes with giving and helping a brother or sister in need.

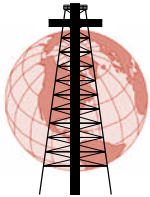
