"How Comfortable Are We?"

—Islamic Christianophobia

The world ignores the persecution of Christians in the Muslim world.

In Egypt, seven Coptic Christians were murdered yesterday by a Muslim gunman as they fled out of a midnight mass in the southern town of Nag Hamadi. In Pakistan, more than 100 Christian homes were ransacked by a Muslim mob last July in the village of Bahmaniwala. In Iraq that same month, seven Christian churches were bombed in Baghdad and Mosul in the space of three days.

Such atrocities—and there are scores of other examples—are grim reminders that when it comes to persecution, few groups have suffered as grievously as Christians in Muslim lands. Fewer still have suffered with such little attention paid. Now a new report from the non-profit ministry, Open Doors USA, shines a light on the scale of oppression.

In its annual World Watch List, Open Doors ranks eight Muslim countries among the 10 worst persecutors of Christians. The other two, North Korea (which tops the list) and Laos, are communist states. Of the 50 countries on the list, 35 are majority Muslim.

Take Iran, which this year ranks as the world's second-worst persecutor of Christians. Open Doors report that in 2009 the Islamic Republic arrested 85 Christians, many of whom were also mistreated in prison. In 2008, some 50 Christians were arrested and one Christian couple was beaten to death by security officials. At least part of the reason for the mistreatment appears to be the result of Muslim conversions to Christianity: Apostasy carries a mandatory death sentence in Iran.

In Saudi Arabia (No. 3), all non-Muslim public worship is forbidden. The state forbids the building of any type of non-Muslim house of worship, and Christian expatriates in the kingdom must practice their faith in private. The same goes in

the Maldives, where the report notes that all citizens must be Muslim; "the handful of indigenous Christians are forced to believe in complete secrecy." Similarly in Mauritania, conversion to Christianity or any other religions is formally punishable by death.

Little wonder, then, that once-thriving Christian community in the Muslim world have now largely voted with their feet by fleeing to safer havens, often in Europe or the United States. That's true even in religiously important communities such as Bethlehem, where the Christian majority has largely fled since the arrival in the 1990s of Yasser Arafat's repressive government and the ascendancy of Islamist groups such as Hamas. By contrast, Christians practice their religion freely and openly in Israel, just a few miles distant.

It might seem natural that at least some attention would be paid in the West to the plight of these Christians. Instead, attention seems endlessly focused on "Islamophobia," not least at the U.N.'s misnamed Human Rights Council. In November, much of Europe went berserk over the Swiss referendum to ban the construction of minarets (though not of mosques). But the West's tolerance for its large Muslim populations stands in sharp contrast to the Muslim world's bigotry and persecution of its own religious minorities. That's a fact that ought to be borne in mind the next time Westerners berate themselves about their own supposed "intolerance."

Please pray each day for our Christian Brothers and sisters around the world who are being persecuted!

They are beaten, denied jobs, some killed, thrown into prison and their families are ripped apart. Why? Because they have fallen in love with Jesus and His

precepts and are willing to die for Him if it means denying Him.

Just last December a 50,000 member church was shut down in China, in the Shanxi province by hundreds of police and thugs. Pastors were thrown into jail, windows and doors were smashed, Bibles were seized and many worshippers were hospitalized.

While the Chinese constitution guarantees freedom of religion, Christians are required to worship in churches run by state-controlled organizations: The Three-Self Patriotic Movement for Protestants and the Chinese Patriotic Catholic Association for Roman Catholics. But more and more Chinese are opting to choose their own churches, despite them being technically illegal and subject to police harassment.

There are an estimated 20 million worshippers in the state controlled churches but an estimated total of 60 million meeting independently in China and this is good news, but it is coming at a great price to those there.

So, how do we compare in the United States? Our president says that we are no longer a "Christian country". Is he correct, a country founded entirely on Christian precepts and principles, our very laws based on the Bible? Of course not, but it is an alarming fact that many denominations here are losing numbers each year. Why is this?

I believe it is because of what my friend retired Colonel Bobby Thompson says, "We have become comfortable Christians.", and I don't think I have to elaborate on what I am talking about. Each of us just has to ask these questions, "Lord, am I a comfortable Christian?" or better yet "Are these saints being persecuted around the world 'comfortable' Christians?"

The early church certainly wasn't comfortable: "Others were tortured and refused to be released, so that they might gain a better resurrection. Some faced jeers and flogging, while still others were chained and put in prison. They were stoned; they were sawed in two; they were put to death by the sword. They went about in sheepskins and goatskins, destitute, persecuted and mistreated—the world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground." Hebrew 11:35-38

Believe, pray, stand and act upon what we believe in. Get uncomfortable today and ask someone if they know Jesus.

DAY 14 – TAKING A WALK

WITHOUT FEAR

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; Psalms 23:4

I don't like walking through the valley. I would rather be on the mountaintop. The sun shines bright. Day holds no secrets. Nothing is impossible. Life is worth living. Transformations take place on the mountaintop. Transfigurations do also. On the mountaintop we hear God. We feel His presence. We bask in His glory and warmth. We glow with His Holy Spirit. No such luck in the valley.

Valleys can be dark and dank, full of shadows. Things lurk above our heads, hiding in the bushes and rocks, ready to jump on us and devour us as we walk through the valley. Death resides in the valley. In the valley you can't see what lies ahead. In the valley the mountain above appears too big. We feel it can never be climbed or conquered, and it can never be trusted. We think it will fall and crush us.

Jesus walked through the valley of the shadow of death. The mountain he climbed cast the shadow. He was crucified on that mountain called Golgotha, the "place of the skull". It was a place of death. Jesus not only walked through the valley, but he carried His cross through it and up the mountain. He did so willingly, without fear. His death was hideously evil. He carried all the sins of the world, both past and future, onto that cross without fear. My sins and yours were on the cross.

The shadow of death was in the valley. Death took place on the mountain top. Jesus died as a ransom for the whole world. Death could not defeat Him though. He conquered the mountain when He came out of the grave.

Now, as I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil. I will face whatever is in the valley because I know I will soon be on top of the mountain ahead. Death no longer dwells in the valley or on the mountain. Death has been conquered. Only the shadow of death still lurks in the valley, trying to keep us from seeing the top of the mountain. The mountain where Jesus stands in transfiguration, shining brightly, His hands held high, a beacon of everlasting hope for you and me.



First Oil Patch Chaplain Training Held in Texas

For the very first time, the Oil Patch Chaplain's Organization based out of Oklahoma City conducted the first two days of a four day course in Texas to train men to become accredited Oil Patch Chaplains.

The course was taught by 21 year veteran, MSgt. Greg Giltner with the Oklahoma City Police Dept., right, and suicide preven-



tion was taught by OPC director Tom Beddow, left, also out of Oklahoma City.

Twelve men were in attendance, with two men driving the longest distance from Artesia, N.M. and one from Tulsa. All others were from the Houston area. Artesia; David Ramsey and Brad Durham, Pastor Scottie Behm from Claremore, Oklahoma and from the Houston area; Ken Lyons, Sonny Sitton, Ed Case, Sean McCoy, Dan Ward, Lane Peeler, Jim Cook and Charles Fretwell and John Bird.

The 13 hour course taught was Critical Incident Stress Management: Individual Crisis Intervention and Peer Support, from the instruction book written by George S. Everly, Jr., Ph.D., F.A.P.M. of The John Hopkins University and Loyola College in Maryland; Assisting Individual Crisis.

All men and women seeking to become Oil Patch Chaplains must be working or have worked in the oil industry.

Our host for the event were Marcy and Bob Schmidt, owners of the Last Wagon Ranch who allowed us to take the course in one of their facilities and where many of us

stayed during the two night, two day event. This is also where the final two day course will be held and taught by internationally known instructor and chaplain to the FBI, Dr. Naomi Paget; BBC, BCETS, FAAETS – Fellow Center for Crisis Management: February 26th and 27th.

Well, what does all this mean? One man asked me last year after I had been accredited, "Can you now perform marriages?" The answer is of course 'no'. But his question was honestly asked and rightly so, because I didn't know what was required of a chaplain either. It was far more involved than I could imagine.

When people ask me this question I can now answer it this way.

First, a chaplain is contacted by someone in authority at the scene to come help intervene in a crisis situation. He does not come in uninvited to help out unless he is asked and is briefed beforehand on the what, who, how and the where of the situation. The chaplain knows what he should do when he gets there but is trained and always flexible to react to any needs that may crop up.

He may be handing out water one minute and the next simply holding a person's hand and letting them speak to him. Depending on the type of event, he and another chaplain might be leading a crisis intervention meeting with a group or perhaps go one on one. It could be the day of the event or days or weeks later, depending on the impact of the event. A chaplain is trying to get people back to some sort of normalcy in their lives and cognitive thinking to avoid post traumatic syndrome.

A chaplain is trained to recognize the symptoms of stress in a person and how to help them handle it, but a chaplain also knows what his limitations are and is trained as to when a person needs professional help and how to get them to such a person.

What about the proverbial chaplain praying, reading scripture and comforting



someone in this manner?

There is a saying that 'all pastors don't make good chaplains but all pastors need to be chaplains'. This is understandable when the most important thing is first get the person stable and comfortable with water, food, clothing or whatever else are their basic needs. If they are hungry, distraught, frightened or otherwise not thinking correctly, a prayer or scripture is not appropriate because they can't receive it.

It is later when it is fitting that these things are done and often comes at the request of the person being helped. The chaplain should be intuitive enough to know when the timing is proper.

Thanks to Tom Beddow and others who established the OPC; a long overdue need in the oil patch.

I had often prayed for people, including my dad when they were going through chemo and battling cancer but I had never prayed for a cure for cancer. Then I got it. God had already called a wonderful couple and family in Texas to lead the awareness campaign. www.prayforacureforcancer.com Today I am asking all my brothers and sisters to **pray for a Cure for Cancer**.

The following is the personal testimony of Kerri Crocker, founder of the awareness campaign, **Pray for a Cure for Cancer**.

My name is Kerri Crocker. I'm a singer/songwriter, entrepreneur, wife and mom who loves the Lord and the following is a story about how God gave me a direction and how with His help, I followed. It's my prayer that after reading this, you will begin to seek out your direction.

One Sunday at our small country church, the preacher asked for praise and concerns. There were praises about safe travels, successful surgeries, even for a child winning first place at a calf show.

As he moved on with prayers of concern, I felt the small whisper and nudge to stand and ask that we all pray for a cure for cancer. Though I hesitated a few seconds, fearing what others would think of this spunky gal in her twenties, I rose and with my heart beginning to race, said these words... "We need to pray for a cure for cancer". I sat down, thinking my task was complete, but as the words had escaped my mouth, God began preparing my husband and me to take this request to the world! The thought of telling others that we need to pray for a cure for cancer, not just pray for the people with cancer would not leave our minds.

I travel around singing and sharing the love of Christ with people and I would always tell of that moment when the Holy Spirit gave me a task to pray for a cure for cancer but I could only be at one church; one event at a time... my voice could only reach so many. It was 10 years before people traveling to MD Anderson Cancer Treatment Center in Houston, TX would first lay their eyes on this prayer request and be wowed that folks that do not even know them are praying for a cure.

We are still very small with only a handful of volunteers, so money has to be raised to fund the monthly bills for the boards. We've done fundraisers from Motorcycle Rallies, flapjack Breakfasts to selling T-shirts at the fair grounds to ensure the 15 billboards we've had up to date would happen. When God starts something, He finishes it J

I'm thankful for the doors He's opened, the people that have helped us in so many ways and for the persistence to keep on keeping on, because now more people than not are being reminded they need to pray for a cure for cancer!

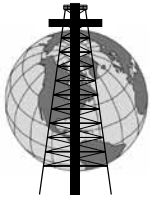
