Bird's Eye View

Like Heaven?

— *It must be Friday*

In talking to our daughter months ago, I asked what it was like attending worship with other Christians in a predominately Muslim country. She said, "It's just like going to Heaven!" And in explaining, she said it was because there are so many countries represented with such a myriad of skin colors, different types of dress and so many dialects, but all with the same Savior, Jesus Christ!

We finally got to witness this first hand when we spent the month of December with her family, some 8000 miles and 9 times zones away from Houston. And yes, the two services that we had the pleasure of attending were a blessing for us as well and truly a glimpse of those who will be in Heaven. Their group of 500 believers is spread into three services because of limited space in a rented villa, as they are not allowed to have a permanent church or a permanent paid pastor. Yet these few represent an astonishing 45 nations! When I looked out over these brothers and sisters in Christ, the song that we sang as kids was vividly brought to mind and I sang it to myself trying to remember all the words; "Red and yellow, black and white, they are precious in his site, Jesus loves the little children of the world.." All I could think of was wow, what a precious blessing to be here with my family at this special time of the year and with this magnificent rainbow of worshippers.

What I am talking about

In one service a couple from Guam lit the advent candles, a black man from Kenya preached a wonderful message on what Christmas was all about and he was introduced by a man from Scotland. The sound man was from Canada, the piano player was from Nebraska and one of the singers was from French Quebec. A woman in a beautiful Sari and her radiating smile passes the offering plate. In a break between services people greet each other with smiles and small talk. Tea, coffee and sweets are served, my wife visits with a woman from India and our daughter is hugged by a teenaged Malaysian girl. We were introduced to people from countries we had literally never heard of. "Would you repeat that please?"



Church and Chili's?

This particular country is extremely wealthy and progressive in many ways and becoming a place to be for all sorts of sports because of the forward thinking Emir. So, along with this comes more westernized restaurants and business, too many to name but notably the largest Dairy Queen in the world, Appleby's, and Chili's. One would never know the difference except for the Arabic names posted beside the English ones and all the foreign workers.

The youngest of our four grand children who just turned four, equates the mere mention of church to eating at Chili's as the family often does after services; "Are we going to church and Chili's? Well, it's cute to her grandparents anyway. "...they are precious in his sight."

Not far from where it all began

A very special night was camping in the desert beside the sea with my grandsons and their dad. With no ambient light, the heavens were a magnificent display of stars as I lay there basking in the grandeur of it all. How could anyone imagine that there was no God and merely put together by happenstance? How small I felt in the vastness around and above me.

As the sun went down I photographed fishermen hauling in their nets, the scene bathed in a huge ball of orange. I couldn't help but think of all the nomads who once fished and probably camped on the same spot, marveled upward and watched the sun go down looking westward to Saudi Arabia, just as I did that cool night. Was this



the same type of night when the shepherds were told about the birth of Jesus? After all,

as the crow flies I wasn't that far away, I mused.

On a side trip to Cairo and Luxor, the Bible really came alive as we visited the pyramids of Giza and places where pharaohs once ruled; a country where Jesus spent time as a child and Israelites followed Moses into the desert and Abraham lied about who his wife was.

Most of these Bible stories were centered 14 miles south of Cairo in a city called Memphis that was the first capitol and once had a population of over a half million people. Today it is mostly covered with farm land, the four great palaces all gone and very few people live there.

Here Abraham and Sarah and their nephew Lot came 4000 years ago. Here Joseph was sold as a slave and later ruled Egypt as prime minister. Here Moses was brought up by the Pharaohs daughter and it was here that Aaron demanded that the Pharaoh let the people go. And of course it was also here that the Egyptians suffered from the many plagues.

Because the Egyptians believed in an afterlife and buried their dead, today there is evidence of a cemetery that was an incredible sixty miles long and two miles wide in the desert and away from the Nile floods. Archeologist estimate there were 40 to 50 million remains of animals, men, women, children, and pharaohs; some just covered in sand, others in elaborate graves and well built mastabas and some in seventy pyramids. Hosea talks of this burial site in chapter 9:6 where he writes, "Even if they escape from destruction, Egypt will gather them and Memphis will bury them."



Here is the cool thing though. Jesus is still alive today and lives in the hearts of millions around the world and He promises that we will be with Him in Heaven one day.

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, I would have told you. I am going there to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going." John 14: 1-4

Is Anybody Paying Attention? — does anyone care?

I mention in this month's *Bird's Eye View* about traveling to Egypt and visiting Luxor where Christians once hid from the Romans to worship. Not only did we see this in Luxor proper where the Pharaoh's once ruled but also in the Valley of the Kings and Queens across the Nile from the city. This is an area where the more famous King Tut's, (Tutankhamen – born 1341 BC), tomb was discovered and incredibly was still intact when found in the 1920's. There are scores of other tombs, most having been ransacked by grave robbers during ancient Egyptian times. We traversed steeply and deeply into the solid rock passageways to view four of them.

Here as in Luxor, we saw signs that the early believers had hidden to worship, some of the colorful pagan reliefs on the wall presumably defaced by them because they portrayed other gods with wings and various animal bodies worshipped by the Egyptians.

Tradition says that around 46 AD, Mark began the now Coptic Christian Church in Egypt. Coptic simply means Egyptian. However after the Islamic invasion of 639 and progressing to the 20th century, most Egyptians became Muslim. (Some of the conversions coming from the fact that "Under sharia, non-Muslims are obligated to pay jizya taxes, (material proof of the non-Muslims' acceptance of subjection to the state and its laws.), which contributed a significant proportion of income for the Islamic state and persuaded many Christians to convert to Islam.")

The republic of Egypt recognized Islam as the state religion in 1980 and today out of 80 million Egyptians, 90% are Muslim, mostly Sunnis, and the rest are mostly Coptic Christians.

In Luxor we had a private tour director and our own driver for our group of four adults and four children. Both of these men were Coptic Christians and we enjoyed their company as fellow believers. I asked one of them, "So what is it like living in predominately Muslim country." He smiled and put up his fists and joked, "We fight a lot!"

We laughed with them then, but on January the 1st, just five days after we got back to Houston, 21 of their fellow believers were killed and nearly one hundred were injured when a terrorist blew himself up in the midst of hundreds of worshippers as they left a church in Alexandria, Egypt just 400 miles from where we were.

Further:

-In October 68 Christians were killed in Bagdad.

-On July the 11th in Pakistan, a group of believers met in their church to discuss the security problem. As they left, masked Islamic gunmen killed five of them including the pastor. It took 45 minutes for the police to arrive and another 45 minutes for the first ambulance to arrive.

"Taseer, 66, the governor of Punjab, the country's most heavily populated province, was assassinated Tuesday by one of his police bodyguards after Taseer had campaigned to ease Pakistan's blasphemy law. Religious groups threatened to kill others who questioned the blasphemy statute, which is designed to protect Islam and the Prophet Muhammad from "insult."

- "As the accused killer arrived at court in Islamabad, Pakistan on Wednesday, Jan. 5, 2011, more than **500 Muslim scholars praised the man** suspected of killing a Pakistani governor because the politician opposed blasphemy laws that mandate death for those convicted of insulting Islam."

I can go on but this is what I want to know. Where is the outrage from our government? Where is the outrage of the 2.5 million Muslims in the United States and the leaders of the nearly 2000 mosques found here? Where is the outrage of the news media? And finally and saddest of all, where is the outrage of Christians here in the United States including our pastors? Where are the public prayer vigils?

Lastly, do these two men whom we spent two days with ponder these same questions?

Is anybody paying attention? Does anyone care?

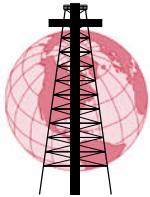
