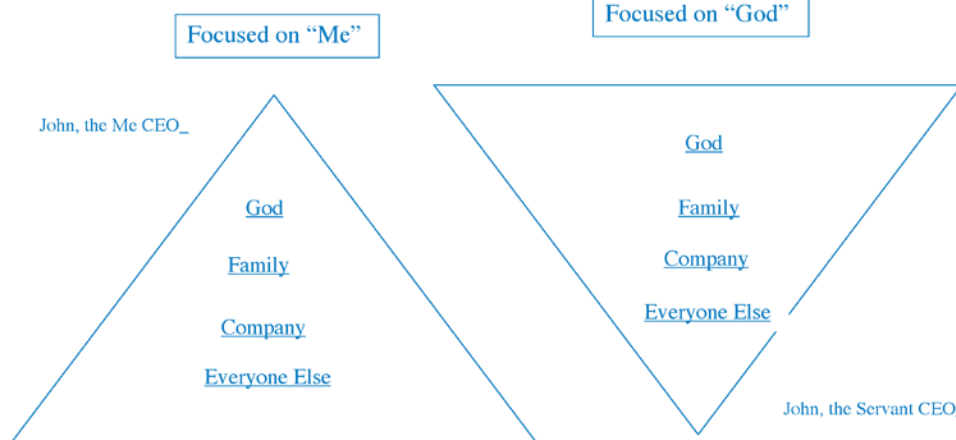

# Bird's Eye View

## To Twitter:

— 1. a trembling agitation 2. To talk in a chattering fashion 3. To shake rapidly back and forth. — Webster's Dictionary



No, I don't 'twitter'. I did twitter, however, when I first laid eyes on my wife. I distinctly remember 'chattering' too much and having a little 'trembling agitation' and then later I also remember 'shaking rapidly back and forth' on the dance floor. I believe it was called the 'twist' then. Perhaps in retrospect it should have been called the 'twitter twist'.

I really hadn't paid much attention to the word 'twitter', only recognizing the term. The same can be said for 'Facebook' or 'texting'. Texting, of course, has been in the news a lot lately, being attributed to teenage car wrecks and, more recently, an L.A. train crash. The engineer missed a light and plowed head on into another train, killing 25 people and injuring many more. There is rumor in the news that he might have been 'texting'.

I can understand how texting can lead to car accidents. Three weeks ago I was moving slowly down highway 59 near the George R. Brown Convention Center in downtown Houston. The traffic was bumper to bumper and it was one of those times when you really have to focus: both hand on the steering wheel and the radio in the off position. Flossing and talking on the phone at the same time was totally out of the question.

Glancing to my right and looking down from my Suburban into a little red car's open window, I couldn't believe my eyes.



There sat the young male driver (and I use that term loosely) holding the steering wheel with his two knees and not looking anywhere but down. His car was moving around 25 mph and his two thumbs about a hundred mph. It put me in a 'twitter' as I realized that he was either texting or twittering away, oblivious to the dangers around him.

## What is Twitter?

Wikipedia describes it as "a free social networking and micro-blogging service that enables its users to send and read other users' updates known as tweets. Tweets are text-based posts of up to 140 characters in length which are displayed on the user's profile page and delivered to other users who have subscribed to them (known as followers). Senders can restrict delivery to those in their circle of friends or, by default, allow anybody to access them. Users can send and receive tweets via the Twitter website, or external applications." ...Got it? Me neither.



[Side bar: We had Twitter back in the fifties but instead of calling it Twitter, we called it a 'party line'. Every farm home had their own distinct ring assigned by the phone company. Ours was two short rings followed by a long ring. Another farm's ring sequence might be two longs and one short, and so on.

Since our one B&W TV channel went off the air every night at 10 PM, listening in on our neighbors' conversations was our only other form of entertainment. Of course we all knew each others' rings and we simply picked whom we wanted to listen in on. However, we didn't call it social networking but rather 'being nosey.']

If you are like me, you're wondering why some people have to be socially engaged at the speed of light, learning every minute detail of another person's life in real time.

Well, we are not all nuts in the way we think, as evidenced by an article I read recently; Far from the Twittering crowd by Elise Amendola.

One of the people featured, a 32 year old lady who unbelievably is in information technology

(couldn't she get enough information?), is giving up 'Facebook' and rolls her eyes at 'twitter'. "I just don't think people need to know that much about my life," she says. You think? No disrespect, but why did you ever think that anyone wanted to know that much about your life?

A twenty year old who works at a Cape Cod inn for summer says he gives up the social networking so that he can, "...relax and focus on other things like music, work and friends." (And perhaps safer driving?) This kid shows real promise.

Another one who gets it: "I'm less concerned with protecting my privacy, and more concerned at the ethics of a 'human zoo' where others' lives are treated as entertainment." So says a public relations executive in Washington, D.C. who dumped his Twitter account and stripped his Facebook page.

## Reality Check

It doesn't take a professor of neuroscience at a university to figure out the flaws with this mind-numbing TMI (Too Much Information). But ok, here is what one said to confirm what most of us who never had to take a TAS test already knew: "Many short contacts may leave the user wanting deeper, more meaningful exchanges," he says. "...A good conversation with a good friend is much more life affirming than a few tortuously abbreviated or emotion-filled lines in a tweet that anyone can read." Again, "You think?!"

Recently one of our pastors, former Astros Craig Reynolds, lamented to us during a sermon about the wasted time that he could have used between games to learn more of the scriptures by heart which would have drawn him closer to the Lord. Of course there was no Twitter, Facebook or their ilk when he played baseball, but just like every generation, we/I waste valuable time away from our Lord and as the professor says and as we already know, "...A good conversation with a *good friend* is much more life-affirming..."

When is the last time that you left everything behind and went into an empty room and had a deep and meaningful conversation with the Lord; a 'good friend'? He tells us to do it and how to do it in Matthew:

<sup>6:5</sup>"And when you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full. <sup>6</sup>But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you. <sup>7</sup>And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. <sup>8</sup>Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him."

## The Mountain Road of Life

Imagine you're going to take a road trip up to the mountains. It's your first time to go there so you are unfamiliar with the roads and terrain. From the valley looking up into the mountains, you are awed by the majesty of the mountains. You know the view looking down into the valley from the mountain will be grand when you get to the top. With much anticipation, you begin to drive up the mountain road. It starts off gradually but pretty soon you realize the narrow road is steep and full of bumps, sharp turns, switchbacks, and blind curves. You also realize there are no guardrails. Now, the much-anticipated scenic view of the valley is forgotten because you must keep your attention on the road and navigate it carefully. Sure, there are a few short straight-aways where you can take a deep breath before the next curve, but not many. There will always be the reckless, fool-hardy types who will drive as fast as they dare, slamming on the brakes when they reach a curve, or getting too close to the edge. But you are more prudent; you press on cautiously.

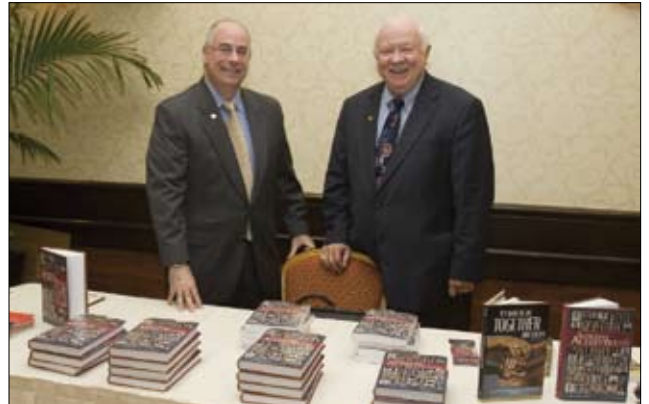

You must keep your eyes on the road at all times.

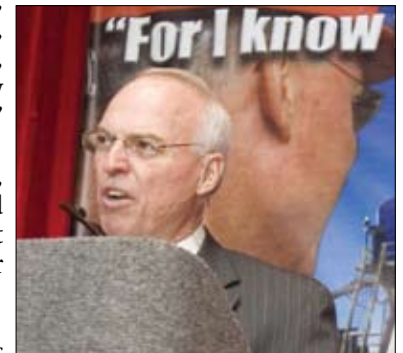
that we all know that God was talking about bringing back the Israelites from being held captive by the Babylonians but many of us are being held captive as well by our own 'Babylonians'.

3. We need people to help distribute Bibles, both the Oil Patch Bibles in English and Spanish, and the many other international languages that we can supply to people going overseas. You can help with this by getting Bibles out to the rigs, platforms and offices. Or if you or one of your co-workers is traveling overseas, you or they can carry Bibles with them which the OCF can supply. (Donations are always welcome for the expense of the Bibles and sending them.)

4. We need help getting Oil Patch Bibles cheaply into Canada and other foreign countries. International Postage rates have gone through the roof. (Just this week we sent five cases of Bibles to Alberta and the cost to the OCF was \$209!) The OCF is looking for someone who can ship a large volume of Bibles to Canada and someone there to see that they are sent out. We will reimburse them the postage, etc.

We are also looking for a way to get cases of Spanish Oil Patch Bibles to Bogota Columbia as well. We like to be good stewards of donations and piggy back with cargo going into foreign countries. If you know how the OCF can get Bibles to Bogota or Canada cheaply you would be a blessing.

5. We have been kicking the idea around of starting a chapter in the Greenspoint area. This chapter would serve the Greenspoint/Woodlands/Kingwood area. Are you interested in that kind of involvement? If so we would put a core group together and start the process.

6. We need disciplers. Jesus told us to go make disciples. I believe the time may be right for some form of Bible study or discipleship program to be formed at offices around the world where men and women could gather together under the banner of an OCF Bible study. We have been putting together materials. We could supply chaplains or teachers.

7. We need volunteers to help at the entry tables at the luncheons, ushers at the Prayer Breakfast, and workers at the many events that are held around the country.

8. We need people willing to give their testimony at the luncheons.

9. We need volunteers to help with the organization of the upcoming October Sporting Clay shoot in Houston.

10. If you aren't already doing so, you can attend our monthly luncheons at Houston's First Baptist Church, or if you are in another city make plans to attend the chapter meetings in Midland/Odessa, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Fort Worth, and Tyler, Texas, Morgan City and Lafayette, Louisiana, Oklahoma City and Tulsa, Oklahoma, Denver and Grand Junction, Colorado, The Oil Field Chapel at Big Piney Wyoming, or the chapter at Fort St. John, British Columbia, Canada.

11. We have Bible testimonies translated into Russian and Chinese. We have held off printing these Bibles as we are unsure how many to print and how to get them in country. If you have an inlet in any of these two countries you could help with this decision.

12. We will have more College Leadership Forums. If you want to participate in visiting a campus or get a meeting organized at a college, you are more than welcome to get going and get it organized.

13. Our organization gets the funds to further the Bible Ministry, newsletters and the other things we do through tax deductible donations. Checks can be made out to the Oilfield Christian Fellowship or a secure credit card donation can be made at our website, [www.oilfieldchristianfellowship.com](http://www.oilfieldchristianfellowship.com).

14. Start a chapter in your city or area if you are called to do so (We don't pursue this, but rather let the Lord touch a group of 4- 6 who feel He is asking them to do it.) I hope I haven't overwhelmed you but start thinking and praying about the many threads the OCF has out there plus a few the Lord may be leading us into. I pray God opens your heart and your time to do what He has called you to do. If the OCF is in His plans for you, don't hold back. You aren't limited to only one of the 14 items in this article.

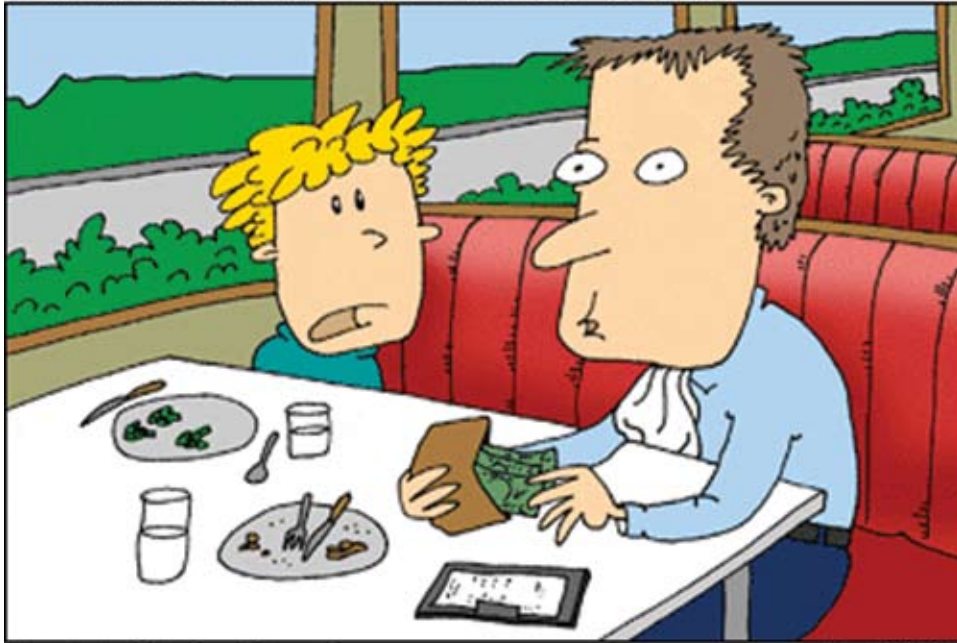

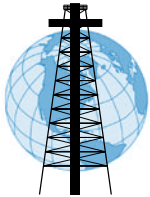
